In Professional and Educational Services, we adopt a holistic approach that recognizes and nurtures each individual's **unique strengths, needs, and aspirations**, starting in childhood. Our goal is to remove barriers and enhance overall well-being.

In 2024/2025, we expanded our services, reaching more families and continuing our commitment to supporting every Autistic individual.

366 families supported across Edmonton and Calgary -
an increase of **6%** over last year.

Meet Jeimee!

Specialized Services and Early Childhood Services have played a vital role in supporting Jeimee's development and our family's growth. Through Specialized Services, I've learned how to support my child's communication, sensory, and behavioural needs, and have gained practical strategies for managing daily routines and transitions.

I've come to appreciate the importance of neurodiversity-affirming approaches that focus on strengths, and I've learned how to collaborate effectively with therapists and educators. What I've enjoyed most is working with a compassionate and knowledgeable multidisciplinary team, witnessing Jeimee's progress in areas such as speech, motor skills, and emotional regulation, and feeling empowered as a parent through consistent guidance and support.

Through our participation in Early Childhood Services, I've gained a deeper understanding of the value of structured, play-based learning in early childhood development. I've learned how inclusive education can foster both confidence and independence, and I've come to appreciate the importance of early intervention and individualized support. What I've enjoyed most is watching Jeimee thrive in a nurturing classroom environment, seeing her build meaningful friendships and engage positively with her peers, and observing her natural curiosity and joy in learning.

Jeimee has shown significant developmental growth across multiple areas. Her communication skills have improved, with increased expressiveness through both verbal language and gestures. She demonstrates greater confidence in social environments, engaging more comfortably with known peers and adults. Her motor coordination and self-help abilities have also advanced, allowing her to perform daily tasks with increased independence. Additionally, Jeimee has developed stronger emotional resilience and improved self-regulation, enabling her to navigate challenges more effectively.

CFASA has been a cornerstone in our journey. Through both Specialized Services and Early Childhood Services, my child has grown in ways that continue to inspire me. I'm deeply grateful for the support, expertise, and care we've received, and I hope our story encourages others to explore these valuable resources.

Family Services

CFASA offers a wide range of resources and workshops designed to support families in ways that are meaningful to them. Our **inclusive Family Nights** and **informative parent workshops** provide welcoming spaces for connection, learning, and shared experiences.

We help families build confidence and develop the tools they need to navigate their communities while making lasting friendships along the way. When families need time to rest and recharge, our **respite services** are there to provide the support they deserve.

342 families supported -

totaling **1,230** individual family members engaged in family activities or programming.

Respite | 214 spots filled from **39** families.

Community Programs

At CFASA we strive to enhance the overall well-being and quality of life of Autistic individuals. Through **leisure, sport, and art opportunities** that promote positive experiences, skill growth, and a sense of belonging, we empower Autistic individuals and their families to live engaged and fulfilling lives.

402 total participants in all programs -
an increase of **3%** over last year.

Art Programs | 81 participants, ages 7 to 29, from **43** unique families attended **3** different art programs.

Sport and Recreation | 80 participants from **57** unique families attended our Basketballers, Basketballers 2, Kickstart Soccer, and Active for Life programs.

Summer Programming | 241 participants ages 3 to 17 from **144** families attended **4** different summer programs.





Annual Art Show

This year's annual art show and sale, *Creative Expression*, presented by Booster Juice, in partnership with the Nina Haggerty Centre for the Arts, was a major highlight, as **36** participants sold **53** artworks. An estimated **125** individuals came through the door purchasing **\$950** of art with proceeds going directly to the artists.

Participants also generously donated artworks to the Bright Night for Autism Art Walk and raised valuable funds for our art programs.





Our first **Bright Night for Autism Gala** brought the community together for an incredible evening of celebration, connection, and generosity. Held at the Edmonton Expo Centre, the sold-out event welcomed **256** guests and raised over **\$180,000** to support programs that empower Autistic individuals, their families, and neurodivergent communities across Alberta.


Bright Night 2025 surpassed fundraising goals and showcased the incredible impact of a community united in inclusion.

Teen & Adult Services

At CFASA, we work alongside Autistic adults, their families and the community to **collaboratively foster independence** and support the development of skills for life as they transition into adulthood and beyond.

187 teens and adults accessed programming -
an increase of **35%** over last year.

Supported Independent Living

Supported Independent Living (SIL) offers one-to-one support for neurodivergent participants and provides Quest graduates a natural next step toward greater independence. Recognizing that independence looks different for everyone — whether learning life skills, finding work, managing money, or building community connections — participants work with a Community Rehabilitation Worker to set meaningful goals that reflect their personal vision for adulthood.



Meet Alma!

SIL support means me having support to meet my goals, and create goals in my life to better it and become more independent. My life has changed since starting SIL. And the support is awesome — having staff being with me so I can understand things like AISH forms, doing my income taxes, and supporting me in my life.

One thing I would tell people who want to start SIL is that the staff are very supportive, kind and helpful in my life, organizing what I want to accomplish during the day and for my future; like budgeting to pay my bills.

EmploymentWorks



EmploymentWorks is a program funded through the Government of Canada, and managed by the Sinneave Family Foundation, that supports individuals with autism and other neurodevelopmental disabilities in preparing for, getting, and keeping **meaningful employment** or **pursuing further education**.

Participants | 64 participants completed programming focused on employment readiness, active labour market participation, and employment retention.

Employment Partnerships | 2 new partnerships were formed bringing the total to 15.

35% of participants -

secured employment or returned to post secondary within 12 months of program end.

Community Impact

We are dedicated to building a community that **appreciates, accepts, and creates opportunities** for Autistic individuals. We are fortunate to have the support of volunteers, funders, donors, partners, allies, advocates, and self-advocates who join us in our mission. Our Volunteers

Meet Carolyn!

When you meet Carolyn, one thing is immediately clear—she brings warmth, curiosity, and genuine care to everything she does. Since joining CFASA in 2024, Carolyn has become an integral part of our programs, volunteering in summer programming, Exploring Art, and Shop, Cook, and Learn. Whether helping teens find their confidence in the kitchen or encouraging creativity in art class, she has a natural ability to connect with participants and make them feel seen.

Carolyn recently graduated from the University of Alberta with a BSc in Psychology, specializing in cognition, neuroscience, and research. She now works as a Recreation Therapy Assistant in a continuing care setting supporting individuals living with mental health concerns, addiction, and brain injury. Her professional and volunteer experiences often inform each other, helping her grow her skills in empathy, patience, and adaptability.

Her connection to the autism and neurodivergent community runs deep. Many of her friends and family are neurodivergent, and through them, and her own discovery of her neurodivergence, she's developed a strong understanding of what community and support truly mean. "It's a constant learning curve," she says, "but we all work together to support and understand each other."

Art and cooking stand out as her favourite programs. She loves how these programs allow participants to explore their own interests, experiment, and build independence. "It's amazing to see how confidence builds over time," she says. "When people feel supported, they're more willing to try something new."

Carolyn is especially proud of moments when she's helped participants feel understood. She recalls working with a young artist who loved sharing the characters she created. Each week, Carolyn made time to ask questions and learn more about their stories. "It's really important to have someone take interest in what you care about, and I'm glad I can be that person."

For Carolyn, volunteering at CFASA is just as rewarding for her as it is for the people she supports. She appreciates how the CFASA's programs encourage autonomy and connection, giving participants the chance to experience activities in a way that works for them. "Those experiences really mean a lot," she says. "Everyone needs their own brand of recreation therapy."

Carolyn's commitment to inclusion, empathy, and growth shines through in every interaction. Her presence reminds us how much impact one person can have simply by showing up, listening, and helping others see the best in themselves.
